Instructor of the Humanities /Social Sciences, Bard Sequence Program.

(Instructor sites in the first semester of the program are located in Orange, New Jersey and Brooklyn, NY)

The Bard Early Colleges and the Bard Sequence Program:

The Bard Early Colleges (BECs) are founded on the belief that many high school-age students are eager and ready for the intellectual challenges of a college education. The Bard Early Colleges act on this belief by providing younger scholars with a tuition-free, credit-bearing college course of study in the liberal arts following the 9th and 10th grades. Students are taught by college faculty in seminar classes and earn college credits up to an associate in arts (A.A.) degree from Bard College, concurrently with a high school diploma. Now in its second decade, the Bard Early College network serves over 2,850 students in campuses in New York City, New York, Newark, New Jersey, New Orleans, Louisiana, Cleveland, Ohio, and Baltimore, Maryland.

Bard invites applications for a dynamic individual who seeks to join a new initiative of the Bard Early Colleges - the Bard Sequence - being piloted in SY 2019-20. Through partnerships between Bard College and public high schools and school systems, the Bard Sequence allows students in the 11th and 12th grades to take Bard College's signature interdisciplinary humanities "Great Books" Seminar Sequence on site at their schools, taught by an instructor selected and trained by Bard. The Bard Sequence offers students earlier exposure to college study and the opportunity to earn 12 Bard College credits over four semesters.

Position Requirements:

The successful applicant for this position must be committed to teaching college classes to high school-age students. A terminal degree in a humanities or social sciences field is required (candidates who are ABD will be considered); candidates with high school and college teaching experience are preferred.

Key responsibilities:

The responsibility of a Bard Sequence faculty member is to teach Bard College's signature humanities seminar course ("The Bard Sequence") to students enrolled in high school at a partner public school. Instructors will have access to curricular resources, professional development, and a community of instructors teaching the course. Faculty will teach between two and four sections of either Freshman or Sophomore seminar, or a combination of both.

Bard Sequence faculty is required to participate in pre-course training and ongoing professional development to aid in the teaching of the dual enrollment courses. This professional development is overseen by the Director of the Bard Sequence and the Bard Early Colleges, Bard College's early college division. Bard Sequence faculty report to the Director of the Bard Sequence.

Summer Fellowship, Museum of Pop Culture

Application deadline: May 13, 2019
Eligibility: Level 2 and 3 doctoral students. Students graduating in September 2019 are still eligible.

Originally known as Experience Music Project (EMP), MoPOP opened in June 2000. EMP's mission was to explore creativity and innovation in popular music. However, over the last 17 years since its inception, the museum has evolved, and was driven by a greater mission: to make creative expression a life-changing force by offering experiences that inspire and connect our communities. From this, MoPOP expanded in its scope and was able to reach a broader audience, reflected in its new name as the Museum of Pop Culture.
Since its launch, the museum has organized more than 85 original exhibitions, including but not limited to: *Bob Dylan's American Journey, 1956-1966; Nirvana: Taking Punk to the Masses; Star Trek: Exploring New Worlds; Can't Look Away: The Lure of Horror Film; and Fantasy: Worlds of Myth and Magic.*

MoPOP's core values rest on five guiding principles: Open arms – practicing radical hospitality and equitable access; Creative exchanges – creating a space for community voices and collaborations; Light bulb moments – using pop culture as a catalyst for learning, connecting, and creating; Pursuing excellence – believing in integrity, innovation, and hard work leading to amazing things and; Excitement – valuing the thrill that comes from experiencing creativity together. In order to continue to grow and reach an even greater audience it is essential that MoPOP seeks venues past the realm of Seattle, WA, one such place is New York City.

Starting June 2019, the MoPOP Summer Fellow will work closely with, and be supervised by, MoPOP's curatorial director to research and develop content for an exhibition about pop culture and New York City.

The fellowship will include:

- Conducting historical and original research for exhibition content
- Researching, sourcing, and selecting images and media
- Researching and sourcing potential artifacts
- Researching key artists and experts for filmed interviews and helping to conduct interviews
- Working with the exhibition design firm on content development
- Communicating with other museums, institutions, and lenders

Requirements

- Strong research, writing and organizational skills
- Strong communication skills
- Serious love of pop culture and deep knowledge of New York City
- Available for weekly check-ins with curatorial director via technology (Zoom, Skype, etc.) to discuss progress
- Available for monthly in-person meetings with curatorial director and exhibit design firm in New York City

Fellows will receive

- The fellow selected will be hired by Vulcan Personal Services and will include the standard Vulcan NDAs, and allow her/him to work in New York City. The fellow shall be paid \$25 per hour for 200 hours over nine weeks (10-30 per week) for a total amount of \$5,000
- The fellow is not eligible for benefits, but she/he will be reimbursed for transportation pass for the duration of the fellowship.
- Additionally, at no cost to the fellow, Vulcan will fly her/him to Seattle for the Vulcan intern orientation taking place on June 17, 2019. This will include a tour of MoPOP, hotel and per diem provisions. Please note, human resources at Vulcan will provide and coordinate all respective travel to and from Seattle, WA.
